### **Editor's note**

Algeria's army chief of staff Ahmed Gaid Salah on Monday <u>called for the country's electoral</u> <u>commission to announce a date</u> for delayed presidential elections - to take place this year - by mid-September.

This comes <u>seven months into unexpected mass protests</u> against the country's entrenched political establishment. This led to the resignation of president Abdelaziz Bouteflika in April, after the military turned on the longtime ruler.

Since then there has been a <u>high profile purge</u> of influential figures linked to Bouteflika's 20-year rule, a bid to appease demonstrators and distance the military and ruling National Liberation Front from the former president.

Despite this demonstrations continue, calling for more meaningful political reform.

The impasse is also <u>making things worse</u> for Algeria's oil-dependent economy. Reforms including subsidy cuts and diversification plans have stalled, firms are struggling to pay wages, and strategic investment into the automotive and oil and gas sectors are on hold due to political uncertainty.

This will likely fuel protests, with a lack of economic opportunity - including estimated youth unemployment of 25% - being a key catalyst in the first place.

The call for presidential elections is a bid to break the impasse. Assuming they go ahead, it's

doubtful that this will address the deeper political and economic issues at play.

There is much unfinished business in Algeria.

Zambia's Chamber of Mines has said mineral royalties should be capped at 7.5% in the country's 2020 budget to avoid risking a drop in investment, amid government plans to raise taxes on the industry.
